Just like the UK, August is also a time of weddings in Kenya and on Saturday 30th, I presided over a wedding of a nephew. Weddings offer families an opportunity to come together and enjoy each other's company as they celebrate together. It's worth remembering though, that some people are not fortunate enough to be surrounded by family day the 24th of August members. And as I reflect on life in our three congregations, I am conscious that there is a large and growing number of people who live often as they would like to. Granted, today we all lead busy lives and often families are scattered over the country residing in areas where they can be gainfully employed. I know

pastorally visiting who find evenings difficult and some for whom weekends are the loneliest time. I recognise and acknowledge the crucial and important role the pastoral care teams play in plugging this gap among the lonely in our community whenever they can. I pray that they may be strengthened for this selfless work. During our Lords time here on earth, he encouraged us to invite those who were not in a position to return a favour when we have parties and meals together. He deliberately went out of his way to seek and eat with all manner of people, including many who the society had marginalised and treated as outcasts. We could do well to pick a leaf from Christ by inviting people who might be lonely in our communities to our parties and social gathering. Such an invitation may just be the highlight of a lonely person's life and who knows, it might be a turning point in their lives. Blessings on you all as you contemplate the invitations and the autumn season ahead! Shalom.

Once again the Winter Watch Cafe will open it's door on 9th January 2015, each week-end until the end of March. Friday & Saturday evenings from 9pm.until 1.30am, Sunday evenings from 9pm until 12midnight.

Lots of hot food & drinks are served. Hot showers are available. On some nights a chiropodist is on hand to help and at other times a hairdresser is available all at no cost.

This last winter over 2.500 meals were served over the three month period to vulnerable people who needed these services.

There are newspapers, magazines, games ie chess, dominoes cards etc. & lots of chat for people to relax with friends.

Bank Top Church has several volunteers who over the years have taken part in this project.



A Merry Christmas Crossword



when it pops up in November, rather than December. Anyway, it's the start of the Liturgical year for most Christians.

Christmas actually starts with Advent Brunch when through an act of a very loving God we are offered bacon, sausage and egg barms served up by His little angels dressed as Guides. His archangels strive faithfully in the smoke and heat of the battle (or the kitchen as it is sometimes known.) there is only one reason to be joyful for the arrival of Advent then that can be it. No skipping of verses. The full monty, bring it on! There will be our normal Midnight Communion Service on Christmas Eve at 11:30. You are all very welcome, bring your friends and neighbours, welcome the babe.

After Christmas, New Year lurches in with those ill kept resolutions. I'm up for thinking what Bank Top's resolution should be. What would make 2015 a great year for Bank Top? It's very tempting to sit back and dream great things. And often decide that they're actually too difficult. At that point the temptation (and it's always worth remembering that temptation did not end with Jesus in the desert 2000 year ago) is to fall back on the "all we can do is keep our heads above the water." Revert to business as usual, nose to the grindstone. Trundle on. But there are other ways – We are supposed to be led by the Holy Spirit and, you may be astonished by this, the Church Meeting is supposedly the place where we discern the will of the Spirit. I admit that I probably don't invite the Spirit into our Church Meetings very often. They're already "Revert to business as usual, nose to the grindstone. Trundle on." So on a personal note, maybe that should be a resolution for me to think about and maybe it's one you should hold me to.

And as an alternative to thinking up our own grand plans, another option is to look around us and see what God is already doing nearby, what could we help in, where could we make a difference. I was struck by the suggestion of "messy church." Activities put on for children, normally on a Saturday. Cutting and gluing – messy. But yes we don't have the space, the people, the time so it's a no.

But why would we want to do it? You'd need more children, more helpers. It's not a job for one church. It's a job for a group of churches. Not a formal group, just churches near each other. Maybe somewhere nearby there's another church or another couple of churches saying "too hard for us." Just a thought.

So Christmas blessings to you all, have a wonderful time and know that He is there waiting to be invited in.

FINANCE - PLEASE READ

This article is a follow-up from the financial breakdown that Val Singleton explained to us during our recent service.

First let me thank each and every one of you for the continued support that is given to Bank Top throughout the year.

It is heart warming to be among so many caring individuals that form the Bank Top family. They say that time and tide waits for no man, and where the finances of Bank Top are concerned that is very true. The recent changes to the contribution Bank Top has to make to the Synod, together with the usual inflationary pressures that occur means we will be running the Church at a loss in 2015. The offerings we receive from regular attenders is a wonderful gift; however we would like to ask that you consider giving even on the weeks when you are unable to attend.

There are a number of ways in which this can be done;

Standing Order

If you can set up a regular standing order, this gives Val an advanced picture of monies that are coming in. If you are a tax payer and fill out a gift aid form then Bank Top can also claim money back from the government.

For a Bank Top Standing Order Request form you can either go on the Bank Top Website or ask Val; (all your personal detail are kept confidential and the only person that can alter a standing order is yourself)

Offering Envelopes

These are designed so that you can budget a regular offering each week and place them in the collection whenever you are able to join us at our regular Sunday services. (If you would like some envelopes for 2015, please ask Val now)

Sunday Service Offerings

Each week we collect cash offerings offering from people attending the Sunday service.


Bank Top has long been a communal focal point for many groups and organisations, so anything you are able to give to help Bank Top raise the funding needed would be gratefully received.
