Hi all,

Well, I was just reflecting on how long this coronavirus has been keeping us locked away, and I decided to check my calendar. In 2020 from January to lockdown we were able to meet in church for only 11 weeks. So, that means we have been in lockdown longer! – 11 weeks from March up to the 24th May – and still counting!!

My husband, Graham has been shielding now for 10 weeks, and, although at the start he was quite happy; getting out into the garden in the nice weather, he's now desperate to go out and has even started wearing his Caribbean shirts this last week – should I be worried!!

I think now we are all starting to feel isolated, not being able to meet with family and friends, and for all those living alone, it must be a lot worse. Hopefully in the coming weeks we will see things start to improve, but I think it will be a slow process and people are going to be very cautious when it comes to gatherings where there are lots of people. I really don't know at this current time when it will be possible to worship again in church – it could be late July/August, and even then we will need to plan carefully for the return so that people are not too near one another.

On a more optimistic note, there has been a good response to the Zoom service at 11.00am on Sunday mornings and we are very grateful to Andy and Heather for leading that worship. We do all have a good laugh when it comes to the hymn singing – with the slight delay it means we have a somewhat staggered ending to each verse! And just when we feel we are getting better it goes awry once more!! There must be about 23 members from Bank Top most weeks and a further 8 or 9 from Egerton. It's really good to see one another every Sunday. If you want to join in with the Zoom services please contact me or Andy for joining instructions. For those who are not very technical I am sending out hard copies of the Synod Sunday service which goes out each week, and which you can also access online. If you are not receiving this or want any more information on anything please give me or Andy a call.

Last Sunday it would have been our Annual Sermons (always on the 3rd Sunday of May) and Heather posted some photo's from past sermons on our Zoom service. Sermons used to be a rather grand affair, with three services; morning, afternoon and evening. In the afternoon we would all gather at church, and, led by a band, we would march around the local area; band, then guides, brownies and rainbows at the front, with the singers behind and the rest of the members at the back. It was a wonderful witness to the local community. Of course, there was nothing else to do in those days; before Sunday opening hours for shops and Sunday sport. Those were happy days, and then the local authority took over from the police, and introduced an £800 fee for our so called protection when we were on the roads! To be truthful, by this time we had reduced to just two services and even then we were struggling for numbers in the afternoon because of other distractions. So, we decided to change to just the one service held in the morning and afterwards a BBQ on the Community Garden. This has proved to be a very popular event I have included some pictures of the sermons from different years. I also found some of the Windermere Centre, which was a very popular attraction at one time.

Finally, I don't suppose many of us will be going on holiday this year, especially abroad. Maybe later on some of us may get away for a break in this country. Let's hope the weather continues to be this lovely for the rest of the summer, so that we can get out into our gardens, or walk in our lovely surrounding countryside. I expect most of us will be healthier than we were before at the end of all this. And let's hope the new us will stick around for a very long time, and maybe the world will be a better place.

FINANCE REPORT



I am not including the usual finance report because since the last Newsletter our financial situation has been very different! Income has been somewhat different to normal, and I did mention Offertory in my recent letter which hopefully everyone received.

On a positive note, people are still continuing with Standing Orders which total almost £800 per month, and since lockdown, I have received envelopes from people totalling £250 and Cash of £250, plus one person has transferred £120 directly into the Bank. I would like to thank these people, and I would like to appeal to everyone by asking you to put money into your envelopes or cash on one side each week, or, if you wish, you can pay directly into our Bank. You can drop your envelopes off at my house anytime. I know some of you may be struggling financially at this time and the last thing I want to do is put pressure on to you; I just would like you to be mindful of our church situation – we have missed two Brunches, and will also miss June's; the Village Fair is looking very unlikely, and all our Lettings income has stopped. However, we still have to pay almost £1,500 to Synod each month plus our utility bills etc. It is a worrying time for all of us. But, we are possibly in a better financial situation than a lot of other churches, so let's simply carry on as best we can, and with everyone's help and lots of prayers we will be OK!

Message from our Partnership Minister – Rev Ruth Watson

Each week Ruth circulates a reflection to all the 15 churches in our Partnership. The one from last Sunday you can read below.

Reflection for Sunday 24 May 2020

"he was taken up to heaven as they watched him, and a cloud hid him from their sight" (Acts 1: 9)

Ascension. Not something in the free churches we spend a lot of time debating. But what did happen to Jesus after his Resurrection and before Pentecost? We read of his appearances to the disciples and of the coming of the Spirit, but often miss out the bit where he goes back to his Father in heaven. Gone but not forgotten. While Jesus was no longer physically present following his ascension, he was no

less present in the lives of the disciples. More so on the arrival of the Spirit, but they long remembered his words, his actions - why else would they have written them down for others to read?

In this time of lockdown, we can relate to not being able to physically see our friends and family. We may not be able to be with them, but they are no less a part of our lives. Communication with them is essential, but nothing beats a get together, or family hug, or meal with friends. While we understand the need for the separation, it does not make it any easier.

Often when we are in difficult circumstances it can feel as if a cloud separates us from God, and we cannot see him or feel his presence. We become angry because we feel he has abandoned us at the time of our greatest need. We may find difficulty in prayer because of this perceived separation. But God is very much still here.

When we face our fears, and feel isolated and alone, let us remember the words at the end of the Footprints poem - "it was then that I carried you".

May we feel safe in God's protective care as we continue to face the difficulties of the current crisis. As we start to think about moving forward, let us remember it is ok to not be ok about releasing restrictions and going out into the new "normal". This is going to take time and there is no right or wrong way to feel about that.

Know, as always, you are held in prayer and that God's love surrounds you always. **Keep safe**. **Rev Ruth**
