Easter Letter from our Partnership Minister, Jack Embrey

Dear all,

Jesus talked about the signs of the times (Matthew 16: 3). There are signs all around us today, some positive, some pointing to difficult things and some which are not easy to interpret.

At a very basic level, there are daffodils in our gardens, there's blossom on the trees and the days are getting longer, so we know that spring is in the air. There have also been unusually heavy rainstorms this winter and very high winds, which appear to be connected with climate change. However, to interpret that sort of sign properly, we need to look at the weather pattern over an extended period, and we also need help from experts, who can tell us what is really happening and why.

There are also signs all around us with a more human origin. Again, some are simple to interpret. Easter eggs have appeared in the shops and before long, we'll see many more children playing outside, as the school holidays start. These signs indicate that Easter is fast approaching.

However, if we want to know where we really are as a nation, or as a human race, the signs are even more complicated to interpret than those which point to climate change. Human signs are often contradictory and it's difficult to know which expert to believe as we try to interpret them.

It doesn't help that one of the signs of our times is the sheer volume of information being produced all around us. On top of that there is a good deal of misinformation and disinformation amongst it. That can make it very difficult to interpret what is really going on.

There are signs of problematical times close to home. These include the increase in the number of folks needing to use foodbanks, stories of wholesale job losses and the rising cost of living. Of course this is affecting us all, but it hits those who are already finding life difficult the hardest. These are our neighbours.

Right at the moment, the most disturbing signs of our times are the pictures of the devastation in Ukraine and of refugees fleeing for safety. These too are our neighbours. Jesus would be asking us to open our eyes to see these signs and our hearts to take whatever action we can. He would also be weeping over Ukraine as he did over Jerusalem and saying to us all 'if you, even you, had only recognised...the things that make for peace'. (Luke 20:42)

At this time every year we remember that Jesus, the Prince of Peace, died for each of us. We also need to remember that Jesus died for each of those who is fleeing Ukraine, for each of those who have stayed to defend their country, for each of those who is struggling in this country and for the Russian nation too.

We are called to reach out to those in need, whether they are hungry, or in need of a welcome. (Matthew 25: 34-40) However, being alive to the signs of the times doesn't just mean being alive to the need around us. It also means being alive to the causes of the world's problems and to doing our bit to try to move the world closer to the Kingdom of God. What does make for peace? Real peace with justice, mercy, truth and love? (Rejoice and Sing 641) How can we do more to spread peace here in Bolton and further afield in our own choices, actions and votes? If we can spread justice, mercy truth and love step by step on our doorstep, then perhaps we can also help to bring true peace to our world. Shalom,

I think they did cheer people up and people from the community did call round to collect and showed their appreciation.

Of course, during lockdown we had to cancel all of our weekly groups and as we came out of lockdown sadly we did lose some of our lettings: Weightwatchers, Moo Music and Sweaty Mamas. However, I'm pleased to say that most people did return and you can read their reports in the rest of this document, and how they coped with lockdown.

Over the past few years, as our congregation numbers have fallen, so too have our numbers of young people. However, this year our numbers started to increase, and I'm pleased to report that we now have thirteen children regularly attending. During lockdown I emailed the lesson out each week to make sure that I kept in contact with everyone, and this seemed to work well. We try to follow the lectionary reading each week, with the help of 'Root's' publications, which we subscribe to. In December we practiced for the Nativity and then the Covid numbers rose drastically, and church was forced to close again. However, the decision was made to hold the service on the Community Garden, and the Nativity went ahead on a very sunny (but cold) morning, with parents being encouraged to dress up and join in – which they did really well. The children were amazing, and we had a super turn out – attracting local people as well as our church members.

During the time between March 2020 and July 2021 the majority of services were led by Andy and Heather on Zoom and some of the time (depending on what tier of lockdown we were in) both on Zoom and in Church. I am sure as a congregation we would all like to say a huge 'thank you' to Andy and Heather for all their hard work preparing services and for their technical skills setting up Zoom week after week so that we could continue to worship on Sunday mornings.

Towards the end of 2020 we welcomed our new pastorate Minister Jacky Embrey. Due to her serving 15 churches in our Partnership Jacky is only able to preach for us on a few occasions throughout the year. Jacky prefers to preach on two or three Sundays together at each Church so in 2021 she preached during Lent and at Christmas time.

Some of our lay preachers continued to preach during lockdown sometimes just on Zoom and sometimes in Church and on Zoom. Adrian Yapp, Leo Roberts, Mark Bates, Mark Curtis, Barry Bradshaw and Dave Bagley continued to preach for us

either at home on Zoom or in Church and on Zoom. We remember our Zoom choir was entertaining for all of them but in particular for Dave Bagley. The Worship Group also took services on Zoom and in Church. Some of the sketches could be challenging on Zoom and it was good to be back in Church in September 2021 for our Harvest service and in November 2021 for the Toy Service.

In August 2021 we welcomed David Beattie from A'Rocha UK who spoke about climate change and the challenges that lie ahead for churches. We became committed to becoming an Eco-Friendly Church and applied for an award which would demonstrate what we were already doing to meet the challenge and how we could improve in the future. Bank Top was awarded the Silver Standard by A'Rocha UK.

We also introduced an international theme to Church in August 2021 when we were joined by Carla Pickering (a colleague of Mark Curtis) and Gustavo who is from Argentina. During the service we learned a new chorus and Gustavo accompanied on guitar.

As in previous years Church Elders David Canham, Val Singleton and Alison Spence have led worship. David organised two 'songs of praise' services, one of them a Christmas 'song of praise'. In February David's daughter Julia joined him to lead worship and she gave an update on her progress with the 'Street Children of Malawi' charity – our chosen charity in 2021.

We were all very much looking forward to our usual Christmas services in 2021 but at the last minute another variant was detected and caused Covid cases to soar. A meeting was held and in true Bank Top style we were able to activate Plan B – Nativity and Christingle on the community garden and what a wonderful time we all had. The weather on that day was absolutely perfect. Then back on Zoom for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services.

Thank you to everyone at Church (including Bible readers) and all our lay preachers who have been involved in Sunday worship especially during the challenging times of the last two years. Julie Skidmore

How Bank Top Guides coped with Covid!

We actually met on a normal Monday night at Guides just a week before we went into 'lockdown'! Who would have known what was to come.

We applied for a free Zoom account from Girlguiding and were very lucky to be successful, this allowed us unlimited meeting time, so we didn't keep getting thrown out every 40 minutes! We were, as a group of leaders, a little anxious about Zoom and how it would work but actually we soon became experts. In some ways, it was nice to just put your uniform on, go upstairs to the study, meet with all the girls and leaders and not even leave your house.

We planned our weekly activities which very often involved driving 'round to everyone's house and dropping off activity packs/resources needed for our meetings. We did lots of exciting things such as a Taskmaster evening, baking and cooking (which the girls loved!), we made birdfeeders and painted bird boxes. At Christmas we made gingerbread bouses

and had a party (along with snacks etc which had been delivered) and we also completed our Northwest Region's 50th Anniversary Challenge. We even had new Guides join us during our Zoom meetings – making their Promise virtually was very strange but very special and I am sure memorable – I had delivered their Promise badges beforehand.

Guide meeting at Bank Top are very often, a noisy affair, and we found it very strange on Zoom as he girls were so much quieter and there was no talking over each other. But it was also lovely as we found that some of our quieter girls joined in much more! We did lose some girls during Zoom, but there were a steady 13 of them joining every week which we thought was quite good! We are slowly increasing our numbers again and after Easter we should have 19, plus 5 Young Leaders. We are hoping to start a Ranger Unit for the older girls after Easter.

When we were able to meet again face to face outside, we spent our summer meetings on the community garden. It was a little cold sometimes (and sometimes a little showery), but it was so lovely to see the girls actually in person again!

We missed our annual camping trips and had planned a trip to Edinburgh which we had to cancel twice! However, we are making up for it now – we have our camp to Pettypool at the end of May and are planning Switzerland in 2023.

We are so lucky at Bank Top Guides to have our dedicated leaders, who really did make the difference during the pandemic and helped Bank Top Guides to keep going!

Sessions were mainly lead by Lauren and her business partner Emma Matthews where the pupils learnt various skills and created lots of online videos as well as having lots of fun with friends. We found that it was important to keep our sessions going through lockdown as it gave our children regular contact with their friends, and it was something for them to look forward to each week.

Dear Friends, Who continue give so generously.

As I said previously in the Newsletter, the accounts for 2019 and 2020 were agreed by the Elders, who were given special power during lockdown. Copies of the accounts for both years were circulated, and Finance reports accompanied both of these sets of accounts.

As a church we did remarkably well during lockdown, with offerings in 2020 exceeding those of the previous year by £1,200! I think we are possibly the only Church within the URC to achieve this, so a huge thanks to everyone for being so generous at such a difficult time.

With regard to the Accounts for 2021, which appear at the end of this report, I would like to make the following comments:

Day to Day Income & Expenditure

Our offerings fell by £772, but they still managed to cover the cost to Ministry and Mission with an excess of almost £1,688. However, this is because Ministry and Mission contributions reduced from £17,592 to £14,556 But in 2022, they are increasing by £3,708 to £18,264, which take them above and beyond the 2021 figure! This means that for every regular church attender (whether member or non-member) we have to pay to Synod, £389, which approximately equates to £7.50 per week. If you pay Income Tax you could agree to Gift Aid your contributions so that church can reclaim tax on your offerings (if you have not already done so), but in order for us to do this, you need to either pay by Standing Order or use the Envelopes. Elsewhere, Income from Lettings suffered as almost all lettings ceased for most of lockdown.

We have recently sold the Portacabin and will therefore save £390 per quarter (£1,560 per year), which we paid to keep it on site. However, our printer died at the end of the year, and we now have a 5-year lease on a new printer at £87.68 per quarter (£350.72 per year)

We were able to put a claim in to our Insurance for loss of Income during lock-down and as a result we received an Interim payment of £5,000 in 2021 and are due to receive the balance of £5,861.49 this month.

F<u>undraising</u>

Unfortunately we missed hosting Village Fairs in 2020 and 2021 and missed income from the lack of an Advent Brunch in 2020. Fortunately we managed to go ahead with the Advent Brunch in 2021, just before we locked down again before Christmas. Brunches were also cancelled from April 2020 to September 2021.

Memorial Fund

We received donations during the year of £5,600

The balance in the bank at the start of the year was £39,635.11 and at the end of the year, £50,701.49, showing an in-year surplus of £11,066.38. Without the Insurance claim and the Memorial donations, we would have more or less broke even.

<u>2022</u>

As I previously mentioned, Mission and Ministry contributions to Synod are going up and energy prices continue to rise. In April we have our Quinquennial Review, which we have to pay for, and which could lead to repairs/improvements. However, we have our Lettings Income once more (albeit less, after losing three lettings); our Brunches are up and running again, and hopefully our Village Fair and Advent Brunch will happen. And we are in a relatively good situation financially with a balance in the bank of £50k.
