### Sermons Day

When I was a child over 70 years ago my family all attended Blackburn Road Congregational Church or the Iron Church as it was known locally. We always celebrated the Sunday School Sermons on the last Sunday in April. We had three services with special preachers (usually past ministers) invited to speak at each service.



The choir sang anthems at each service and of course we had the "little singers" who were the Sunday School children all dressed in white, they also sang at each service. The day began in the morning about 9.45 when we all assembled to process from the church around the streets, behind Hibbert Street, East Bank Street up to the Lake District streets coming back onto Blackburn Road via Ullswater Street and arrived back at Church in time for the 10.30 am service.

In the afternoon we all assembled again on the Sunday School side to process up Blackburn Road to the Tramways along Astley Street and up to Halliwell Road, the down back to Draycott Street before going into the church again for the afternoon service. Then it was home for tea before returning to church for the service at 6.30 pm. The procession was always led by the Sunday school secretary, the treasurer and the minister followed by the little singers, brownies, guides, cubs, scouts, youth club, ladies fellowship and men's group. We would always stop halfway round the route to sing a hymn. All the neighbours would come out to watch us pass by while some male members of the congregation would walk along with collecting boxes for donations to the church. It was quite an occasion and at the end of the day everyone was exhausted. The following week there would be a party for the children as a thank you for their attendance at all the services.

When Blackburn Road Church closed in 1990, I began attending Bank Top. The first service I was invited to attend by Joyce Jones, was the annual sermons on the third Sunday in May. Again, a similar format took place, but there was no evening service and only an afternoon procession around the Whitegate, Parkgate side of Ashworth Lane, then up Hill Cot Road and back to Church, or along Thornham Drive, Langham Close, back onto Thornham and back to Church.

When I first attended Bank Top, Geoff Tolley was the Minister. He was also the Minister of the URC in Adlington and arranged for the Boys Brigade band to accompany the procession. It was quite unusual to be marching round to the tune of "We all live in a Yellow Submarine" and "Nellie the Elephant". As usual the band was followed by the Minister, Church Secretary and Treasurer, the Brownies and Guide, the little singers and the choir and the rest of the congregation. The men of the church carried the banner and others walked along with collecting bags for the donations from the residents of Bank Top Village

As the years passed and Geoff Tolley was no longer the Minister, the Boys Brigade band stopped coming and were replaced by Smithills Band led by Chris Wormold. We continued to process up Ashworth Lane, until the council decided it was too dangerous and we would have to pay a substantial sum of money to close the road. The procession of witness was discontinued and replaced with and open-air service on the community garden with the band playing for half an hour before the service began. In later years the cost of hiring the band became too much and the procession was abandoned to be replaced by one service in the morning followed by a barbecue on the Community Garden which still occurs to the present day.

When I found a souvenir tea towel which Bank Top had printed with portraits drawn by every member of the congregation to celebrate the 21<sup>st</sup> Anniversary of the founding of the URC, there were two hundred and forty-five faces on the tea towel. Many families who have moved on and older members who are no longer with us. This makes me feel so proud and happy to have shared the Christian faith and fellowship with so many people over my 50 years and pray that all who have experienced the teaching of Jesus at Bank Top have gone on to share it with others wherever they may be. So, thank you Bank Top, long may the Church continue to be an influence for good and a witness throughout the surrounding neighbourhood and beyond.
